


Established in 2014, Moawin Foundation (MF) is a registered not-for-profit organization (NPO) operating under Section 42 of the Companies Act 2017, with Incorporation number 0090324, and National Tax Number 4331812-6. MF holds the status of an approved NPO under Section 2(36) of the Income Tax Ordinance, 2001, and has signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the Economic Affairs Division of the Government of Pakistan, enabling it to receive funding from international donors. Additionally, MF is certified by the Pakistan Centre for Philanthropy (PCP) and CAF International, reaffirming its commitment to transparency and accountability.

Moawin Foundation expanded its footprints by registering as a charity (1204000) in the UK with an aim of building a diverse and committed community of supporters to amplify its impact. Through collaborative efforts and contributions, we envision creating significant change in the underprivileged areas we serve.

Our primary goal is to ensure access to quality education, particularly in government schools, and create economic opportunities for women and youth to address the pressing issues of economic instability and poverty. By investing in education and skill development, we aim to empower individuals and communities for financial independence.

Currently, we have 118 operational schools across Pakistan with an enrolment of more than 30,000 students. Our Skills Development Program served more than 1800 households and empowered youth with marketable skills & entrepreneurship support.

Through strategic partnerships and collaborations, we have implemented impactful programs of assisting government and community schools in providing school development opportunities, establishment of Vocational Training Institutes (VTIs), and scholarship programs to provide marginalized youth with the necessary tools and resources for a sustainable future. We also conduct relief efforts during times of crisis, extending assistance to vulnerable communities in need.



Moawin Foundation: Bridging Gaps, Transforming Education

Moawin Foundation is dedicated to advancing quality of education for underprivileged and marginalized communities in remote areas of Pakistan, promoting inclusivity without discrimination based on gender or religion. Aligned with Sustainable Development Goal 4 (SDG 4) on Quality Education, our core mission is to empower and uplift communities through accessible and equitable educational opportunities.

With the support of donors and partners such as , Central Asia Institute (CAI), Federal Directorate of Education, Sindh Education foundation (SEF)-Foundation Assisted Schools, SEF- People Support program (PSP), GB Education department and other government departments, MF is working across different regions, including Islamabad, Sheikhupura, Pind Dadan Khan, Nankana Sahib, Chakwal, Jamali Goth, Gadap-Karachi, Ghotki, Ubauro, Miranshah, and 10 districts of Gilgit-Baltistan.



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VISIT OF CENTRAL ASIA INSTITUTE

The Central Asia Institute is an INGO dedicated to advancing education and vocational opportunities, with a particular focus on empowering girls and women, in the remote regions of Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Tajikistan. Currently, CAI supports 74 schools in Gilgit-Baltistan, providing access to quality education for children in this mountainous region.

During a three-day visit to Baltistan, Ms. Alice R. Thomas, Executive Director of the Central Asia Institute, and CEO Moawin Foundation, Rear Admiral Foad Amin Baig, visited MF-assisted schools to observe the ongoing interventions. The visit included visits to schools in Hoto, Wahdat Colony, Habib Abad Qumra, and Ghaziabad Kachura. The delegation also inaugurated the newly constructed classrooms, met the students and teachers, while also observing an ongoing first aid session organized by Rescue 1122. The last day included visit to Sarber Community School Kuwardo and Balbul Ilm Public School Ranga where they observed students participating in a session on 'Climate Change' by WWF.

Ms. Thomas also met with the graduates of the MF's IT training program who have been provided laptops by Systems Ltd to kickstart their online jobs. During the visit Ms. Thomas engaged with students, teachers, and members of the Mother Forum, to address the challenges and evaluate the impact of interventions on education and skill development in these remote areas.

Central Asia Institute Independent 3rd Party Evaluation

Central Asia Institute carried out independent 3rd Party Evaluation Report to monitor, evaluate, and assess the program implemented by Moawin Foundation in Gilgit-Baltistan.

The main findings state that the community schools exemplify an excellent collaborative model of government, communities, CAI, and Moawin Foundation. They provide quality, accessible education to more than 6000 children-in-need (65% of whom are girls) who otherwise would be out-of-school.



Moawin Foundation has introduced 'Morals and Ethics' initiative to impart ethical values that go beyond academic achievements, aiming to shape individuals into responsible citizens.

Orientation sessions were held in 37 schools for 187 teachers to build their capacity on incorporating activity-based teaching through story-telling, role-play, animations, and group activities.

E-Learning technology has been introduced in 39 MF adopted schools to facilitate students' learning such as, animated story-based videos, interactive exercises and tests, Games, and curriculum-based content. This approach improves the learning experience for students and enhances their conceptual learning.

Moawin Foundation, in collaboration with Aahung and Aga Khan Health Services Pakistan, is imparting Life Skills-based Education in its schools to address key challenges of students' personal and social development. The training sessions include topics on stress decision management, making. communication skills, and regulation of emotions.

EDUCATION INITIATIVES

TRANSFORMING LIVES THROUGH EARLY CHILDHOOD CARE AND EDUCATION (ECCE)

Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) plays a pivotal role in shaping the foundation of a child's lifelong journey. Konain Zahra, a 3.5-year-old student enrolled in the ECCE program at Babul Ilm Public School in Ranga, Skardu, adopted by Moawin Foundation serves as a shining example of how ECCE can transform young lives, enriching their cognitive, emotional, and social development.

Konain Zahra's ECCE Journey

Konain Zahra embarked on her educational journey in March 2023, at the tender age of 3.5 years. Her parents, Saddiqa Batool and her husband, recognized the value of early education and enrolled Konain in the ECCE program of Moawin Foundation, breaking away from traditional norms where education typically begins at the first grade. Saddiqa Batool, a mother and a teacher herself, understood the significance of early childhood education and believed that a child's brain development during this period is rapid and conducive to absorb knowledge.

Konain's ECCE experience has been a delightful one. She shows enthusiasm for learning, citing her favorite shapes and enjoying interactions with her best friend Saima. Her admiration for her teacher, Ms. Tahira, highlights the vital role educators play in creating an engaging and nurturing learning environment. Konain's exploration of the alphabet and Urdu, coupled with her recitation of poems, exemplifies the comprehensive education she receives in the ECCE program.



Beyond academic progress, Konain's ECCE journey has imparted a sense of joy and curiosity in her. Her preference for playing with dolls signifies the integration of play-based learning in the curriculum. The ECCE program not only enhance knowledge but also encourages self-confidence and self-expression, evident in Konain's moment of clapping for herself after reciting the alphabet.

Saddiga Batool: A Mother's Perspective

Saddiqa Batool, Konain's mother, reflects on her own experiences and highlights the transformation in early education. Saddiqa grew up in an era when ECCE was not prevalent; education directly started from the first grade. The emphasis on academics was notable, but the holistic development that ECCE offers was missing. Saddiqa's decision to enroll Konain in ECCE was driven by her belief in the benefits of early education and the opportunity it provides for children to learn through play. Saddiqa's daily routine reflects the complex balance between being a mother, teacher, and homemaker. Her acknowledgment of ECCE's positive impact on her daughter's happiness and self-sufficiency is remarkable. The ECCE program's comprehensive approach, including video content and teacher-student interactions, ensures that Konain's educational journeyis enriching and enjoyable.

By focusing on these skills, we aim to contribute to sustainable and inclusive economic development.









WATER SANITATION & HYGIENCE (WASH)

Moawin Foundation's efforts act as a driving force in achieving the interconnected objectives of Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) and the overarching Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). By actively engaging in WASH initiatives, MF directly contributes to SDG 6, ensuring access to clean water and sanitation for communities in need.

Moreover, MF emphasis on WASH aligns with SDG 4 by creating conducive environments for education. By implementing proper water and sanitation infrastructure in schools, MF supports inclusive and quality education, particularly benefiting girls who may face barriers to attend schools due to a lack of these facilities.

In its efforts, MF also addresses the gender dimensions of WASH challenges, contributing to SDG 5 on gender equality. Recognizing that women and girls often bear the brunt of water and sanitation disparities, our initiatives empower women and promote gender-inclusive practices.

OUR INITIATIVES

- Provided Water Facilities in 118 School.
- Installed over 2200 hand pumps, set up 4 Reverse Osmosis (RO) plants, and distributed home-based water filters throughout Pakistan and Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK). As a result, more than 40,000 individuals from vulnerable communities have benefited.
- More than 28000 students actively participated in Sessions on Health and Hygiene across all MF adopted schools.
- Around 5000 mothers engaged in Health and Hygiene initiatives through monthly and fortnightly meetings of mother forums
- 118 schools equipped with functional washrooms, benefiting more than 30,830 students, faculty, and non-faculty staff.














CLIMATE CHANGE



Opinion

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We have sudited the annexed financial statements of Moawin Foundation (The Foundation) which comprise the statement of financial position as at June 30, 2023, and the statement of income and expenditure, the statement of comprehensive income, the statement of changes in funds, the statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, and we state that we have obtained all the information and explanations which, to the best of our knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purposes of the sudir.

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the statement of financial position, the statement of income and expenditure, the statement of comprehensive income, the statement of changes in funds and the statement of cash flows together with the notes forming part thereof conform with the accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan and give the information required by the Companies Act, 2017 (XIX of 2017), in the manner so required and respectively give a true and fair view of the state of the Foundation's affairs as at June 30, 2023 and of the susplus, the comprehensive income, the changes in funds and its cash flows for the year then ended.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) as applicable in Pakistan. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Replantibilities for the Audit of the Financial Standards Board for Accountants. We are independent of the Foundation in accordance with the Instrustional Ethics Standards Board for Accountants. Code of Bilitia for Professional Accountants adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (the Code) and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Board of Directors for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan and the requirements of Companies Act, 2017/XIX of 2017) and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Foundation's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Foundation or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Board of directors are responsible for overseeing the Foundation's financial reporting process.



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Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs as applicable in Pakistan will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs as applicable in Pakistan, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and

1 CORPORATE AND GENERAL INFORMATION

1.1 Legal status and operations

Moawin Foundation ("the Foundation") is a Not for Profit Foundation / organization limited by guarantee incorporated in Pakistan on October 23, 2014 under section 42 of the Companies Ordinance, 1984 (Repealed with the enactment of the Companies Act, 2017 on May 30, 2017). The Registered office of the Foundation is sinasted at House No. B-9, Navy Housing Scheme, F-11/1, Islamabad. The objective of the Foundation is to improve standard of education/training at government schools and to employ good teachers, train them and make them teach well and arrange vocational trainings for boys and girls in rural areas of Pakistan.

Foundation is certified from Pakistan Centre for Philanthropy (PCP), a certifying body for all local and international NGOs having certification No. PCP-R1/2023/811, having validity till January 16, 2026.

Foundation is registered with Economic Affairs Division, Government of Pakistan and Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) has been signed on September 21, 2020 having validity up to September 21, 2024.

2 BASIS FOR PREPARATION

2.1 Statement of Compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan. The accounting and reporting standards applicable in Pakistan comprise of:

- International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS Standards) issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) as notified under the Companies Act, 2017 (the Act);
- Accounting Standards' for Not for Profit Organizations (Accounting Standards for NPOs) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan; and
- Provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017.

Where provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017 differ from the IFRS for SMEs, the provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017 have been followed.

The Foundation adopted IFRS in preparing its financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2023. The date of transition to IFRS is July 01, 2022. The transition does not have any impact on the Foundation's prior period's financial reporting except certain additional disclosures.

2.2 Basis for measurement

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for certain items as disclosed in the relevant accounting policies below.

2.3 Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Pakistan Rupee (PKR) which is the Foundation's functional currency. Amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded off to the nearest of Pakistan Rupees (PKR), unless otherwise stated.

2.4 Use of estimates and judgment

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with approved accounting and reporting standards requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgment in the peocess of applying the Foundation's accounting policies. Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

- a) Useful life and residual values of property and equipment; and
- b) Amortization of deferred capital grant.
- 3 CHANGES IN ACCOUNTING STANDARDS, INTERPRETATIONS AND PRONOUNCEMENTS

3.1 Amendments and interpretations to accounting and reporting standards that became effective in the current year

There were certain amendments and interpretations to published accounting and reporting standards that are applicable for the financial year beginning on July 1, 2022 but does not have any significant impact on the Foundation's financial reporting and therefore, have not been disclosed in these financial statements.

PERFORMANCE REVIEW:

Moawin Foundation (MF) has been working since 2014 to improve the quality of education for the students enrolled in the Government Schools. MF believes in strengthening the public sector rather than competing with it by raising a parallel school system is more beneficial for the community. MF also creates employment opportunities for people of rural areas (particularly for the female population) by providing them vocational training. Therefore, MF has signed MOUs with the Education Department of the Government of Punjab and Punjab Vocational Training Council to have the Government support. MF started its operations from 1 MF adopted school of Sheikhupura District in Punjab with consistent hard work the total numbers of adopted schools rose up to 118. The current enrollment is outlined by district below:

At present, MF has established a robust presence across all regions of the country, gaining widespread recognition for its impactful interventions in education, particularly in areas such as E-learning and Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE). Notably, MF is committed to embracing modern methodologies, emphasizing the provision of E-Learning Systems. To further this commitment, MF has forged Memorandum of

Understanding (MOUs) with notable partners, including the Sabaq Foundation and Taleemabad, encompassing 59 schools

MF started establishing Vocational Training Institutes (VTIs) from Sheikhupura, and now we have VTIs in Karachi, Chakwal, Noshera and Nankan Sahib, through these VTIs we aim to provide vocational /technical training for students both male and female, who intend to opt for employment after completing middle or high school education. Further MF connects these trained energetic youth members to Akhuwat Foundation for getting access to microfinance, so that they can stand alone and become self-sufficient to generate household level income.

MF has established another model of stitching center called "Sui Dhaga," employing 32 girls, and has partnered with Sapphire and local brands for stitching orders, with girls receiving payment per piece. Beside that MF has also entered into an MoU with Shafi Shoes, leading to the establishment of a "Shoe making center" with 21 enrolled girls for training. These girls are also receiving a monthly stipend.

Currently In Sheikhupura VTI, a total of 65 trainees are enrolled in various trades, while in Baba Island (Karachi), 70 trainees are enrolled in two different trades. At Chakwal VTI, 30 trainees specialize in Dress Making, and Nowshera VTI has 25 trainees enrolled in the same field. Additionally, 23 students have undergone training through the Hospitality and Tourism initiative. Furthermore, 21 students were enrolled in the IT Center in Skardu for training in basic IT concepts. Further, in Skardu, 54 women have also received training under the Apricot and Mulberry Drying Project.

During the year MF continued its operation in 32 Government and 42 MF Community Schools is GB. MF had entered into a MOU with GB Education Department for operating in GB in September 2020 and the same has been extended up to 18 Oct 2028. MF carried out numerous activities on health & hygiene and climate with the help of community in Gilgit Baltistan as well.

This year, MF has undertaken key initiatives, including the establishment of Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) classrooms, reaching a total of 66 classrooms and enrolling 1980 students. Furthermore, the organization is actively implementing Elearning classrooms, providing scholarships to talented and underprivileged students, conducting teachers' training on ECCE and pedagogy, and facilitating the provision of drinking water and sanitation facilities.

This year, MF signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with IHHNL. Collaboratively, MF and IHHNL successfully executed several projects across diverse regions in Pakistan. These projects encompassed the installation of more than 1200 water pumps, Qurbani (sacrificial animal offerings) and distribution of meat among 6000 families, flood relief efforts in Charsadda and Noshera, and support for orphans in KP, contributing to impactful humanitarian initiatives in the local communities.

MF sustained its support for the Sindh Education Foundation project, specifically the 'Foundation Assisted Schools' (two in total) in Karachi. Additionally, MF continued its collaboration with the KP Education Department, providing assistance for quality of education to the Government Girls High School in Darapakhel, located in district Miran Shah

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES:

For the current year Board has raised donations of Rs. 425 million, that were adequate to run the operations of Moawin Foundation. The Board is actively looking to find more partners/ donors to expand its operations in Pakistan. The current activities are funded by individual as well as institutional donors. There are no major risks or uncertainties facing Moawin Foundation.

Auditors

Present statutory auditor M/s Grant Thornton Anjum Rahman, Chartered Accountants have completed audit for the year ended 30 June 2023 and shall retire on the conclusion of 9th Annual General Meeting. Being eligible, they offered themselves to be reappointed. The Finance Committee considered and recommended their re-appointment for the Financial Year ending June 30, 2024. The Board also endorsed the recommendations of the Finance Committee.
